The Next Evangelicalism by Soong-Chan Rah

The projection that by 2050 the population of America will no longer be predominantly white (Anglo) was stunningly confirmed by a prominent demographer at the 2011 Utah Refugee Conference. "Between now and 2050, 80% of the population growth of Utah will be from in-migration people (refugees + immigrants), their kids and their grandkids." So, what impact has this galloping diversification had on the white evangelical church in America?—tragically, almost none, according to author Soong-Chan Rah.

His book, subtitled *Releasing the Church from Western Cultural Captivity*, gives us strong medicine for sure, but Soong-Chan's cry in the wilderness


clearly deserves a hearing, given the kind of reality the above statistics herald. He cites a study showing "just 7.5 % of the over 300,000 religious congregations in the United States are racially mixed... [and] less than 4 % of Christian congregations are integrated." He sees this rooted in "our single-ethnic ministries focused on numerical growth over the biblical value of racial reconciliation and justice."

Soong-Chan, himself a Korean immigrant, claims the American evangelical church is growing exponentially among in-migration, ethnically diverse Christians. Consider Boston: in 1970 the city had 200 churches; in 2000 (just 30 years later) it had 412 churches, and the net gain

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What is the 'real' Mission?

A year ago when *The Vine Institute* started, we expected our focus would be teaching Christian leadership training courses, concentrating among refugees and immigrants. But God has opened our eyes to the fact that He is changing the face of His people in Utah. Therefore, we realized that we must focus not simply on training refugee and immigrant community leaders. We are called to bring refugees and immigrants who love Christ together with mainstream Americans who love Christ. We must encourage relationships of mutual trust, honor, and appreciation essential to effective leadership training and community development within this Body of Christ that is rapidly transforming into a "minority majority." And we realize that as the community around us sees this incarnation of Jesus' way of love for the stranger, rather than living in denial or fear, God may



open their hearts also to the love of Christ.

The three essential elements of this mission are: **connecting** [building relationships of trust across cultures]; **educating** [cultivating growth in Christ by his Word and Spirit]; and **celebrating** [honoring and learning to appreciate what God is doing through others' cultural expressions of faith and life and worship].

was among in-migration communities. At the same time the shakers and movers and opinion-shapers of American evangelicalism remain almost totally white Euro-Americans even as the white church is in serious decline. In a February 2005 *Time* magazine cover story,

though, the 25 most influential evangelicals in America were profiled, and only two of them were nonwhites, perpetuating the American church's white, Western cultural captivity. Soong-Chan invites the white evangelical church to relinquish its power and embrace God's multi-ethnic church. The hope of American Christianity's revitalization lies in merging with the church coming here from beyond our borders. Does this not make the mission of *The Vine Institute* at least ten times more crucial than we ever dreamed?

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
