Christian refugees are not go-it-alone cowboys. They are sheep who have learned the value of faithful following. The next week, after the instructor alerts the senior leader, the junior leaders excitedly report a visit with a mother of six whose husband has left her. They listened to her, encouraged her, and prayed with

her. This report was shared through tears of joy. These leaders are tender undershepherds.
